To: New Boy Scouts and Parents

Welcome to Troop 1 and the ScoutING program. Our troop meets weekly at Florence Christian Church on Tuesdays from 7:00-8:30 p.m. throughout the year, with few exceptions. The troop has a full agenda of activities during the year including summer camp, service projects, camporees, high adventure trips, courts of honor, and more. Parents-committee meetings are held every other month and program planning conferences are conducted annually by the troop committee and the patrol leader's council. Each month, a calendar of troop events is available.

A typical scout troop is organized into patrols with each patrol led by a patrol leader who reports to a senior patrol leader, all of whom are scouts elected by their fellow scouts. Each Scout in a leadership position has the privilege and responsibility to appoint his/her own assistant. The concept of scouts leading scouts, which began when scouting started, can present a significant change to the new scout from the traditional cub scout den led by an adult leader.

In our troop structure, scouts are encouraged and expected to develop and provide the leadership of and for themselves. To support this, Troop 1 is committed to Junior Leader Training within the troop as well as participation in the Dan Beard Council training programs. The adult leadership consists of the scoutmaster, assistant scoutmasters, and troop committee members assuming the roles of advisors and coaches.

Family support and encouragement are critical to a scout's success in scouting and his/her advancement. After a scout completes the joining requirements thus earning the scout badge, next will be to earn the first rank of tenderfoot, as he/she starts on the trail to eagle, scouting's highest rank award. After a rank or merit badge is earned, recognition for these achievements takes place at the next troop meeting and again later at a Troop Court of Honor.

Wearing of the scout uniform is an important part of teaching the aims of scouting: our troop program depends on complete uniforming. The Troop 1 uniform Standard (enclosed) defines when a class A uniform or when a class B uniform is required for specific troop activities. Each month a uniform inspection is conducted. Scouts who are in proper uniform receive an acknowledgement card, six (6) of which can be redeemed for a \$6.00 credit in the scout's personal scouting account. Complete and correct placement of insignia on the uniform per the official insignia guide (enclosed) is part of the inspection criteria.

Please take time to review the enclosed information. Troop policies and guidelines have been developed over the years by the troop committee and the patrol leader's council for the equal benefit of all of our scouts. One copy of the Troop Code of Conduct should be reviewed, signed, and then returned to the senior patrol leader. Also, we would appreciate the return of the adult resource survey.



Boy Scout Joining Requirements

Scout Badge

Each Scout will need his/her own Boy Scout handbook.

- 1. Meet age requirements: Be a youth who is 11 years old, or one who has completed the fifth grade or earned the Arrow of Light Award and is at least 10 years old, but is not yet 18 years old.
- 2. Complete a Boy Scout application.
- 3. Complete a health history signed by your parent or guardian. The entire Personal Health and Medical Record with parts A, B and C must be completed in its entirety and returned to the Scoutmaster.

Purpose of the Boy Scouts of America

It is the purpose of the Boy Scouts Of America to provide an effective program designed to instill within the youth desirable qualities of character, to train them in the responsibilities of participating citizenship, and to help develop their personal fitness, providing this country with citizens who:

- 1. Are physically, mentally and emotionally fit.
- 2. Have a high degree of self-reliance as evidence in such qualities as initiative, courage and resourcefulness.
- 3. Have personal and stable values firmly based on religious concepts.
- 4. Have the desire and skills to help others.
- 5. Understand the principles of the American social, economic, and government systems.
- 6. Are knowledgeable about and take pride in their American heritage and understand America's role in the world.
- 7 Have a keen respect for the basic rights of all people.
- 8. Are prepared to fulfill the varied responsibilities of participating in and giving leadership to American society and in other forums of the world.

Aims and Methods of the Boy Scout Program

Aims

Boy Scouting works toward three aims. One is growth in *moral strength and character*. We may define this as what the youth is himself/herself: his/her personal qualities, values, outlook.

A second aim is *participating in citizenship*. Used broadly, citizenship means the scout's relationship to others. He/she comes to learn of their obligations to other people, to the society they live in, to the government that presides over that society.

A third aim of Boy Scouting is *development of physical, mental, and emotional fitness*. Fitness includes the body (well-tuned and healthy), the mind (able to think and solve problems), and emotions (self control, courage and self-respect).

The methods are designed to accomplish these aims.

Methods

Advancement- Scouting provides a series of surmountable obstacles and steps to over come them through the advancement process. The Scout plans his advancement and progresses at his own pace as he overcomes each challenge. More is discussed about Advancement later in this guide.

Adult Association- Boys learn from the examples set by their adult leaders. Troop leadership may be male or female and association with adults of high character is encouraged at this stage in a young man's development.

Personal Growth- As Scouts plan their activity, and progress toward their goals, they experience personal growth. The good turn concept is a major part of the personal growth method of Scouting. Boys grow as they participate in community service projects and do good turns for others.

Ideals- The Ideals of Scouting are spelled out in the Scout Oath, Law, Motto and Slogan. The Scout measures himself against these ideals and continually tries to improve. The goals are high, and as he reaches for them, he has some control over what he becomes.

Patrols- The patrol method gives Scouts an experience in group living and participating in citizenship. It places a certain amount of responsibility on young shoulders and teaches boys how to accept it. The patrol method allows Scouts to act in small groups where they can easily relate to each other. These small groups determine troop activities through their elected leaders.

Outdoors- Boy Scouting is designed to take place in the outdoors. It is in the outdoors that Scouts share responsibilities and learn to live with each other. It is here where the skills and activities practiced at troop meetings come alive. More is discussed about the outdoor program later in this guide.

Leadership Development- Boy Scouting encourages boys to learn and practice leadership skills. Every Scout has the opportunity to participate in both shared and total leadership situations. Understanding the concepts of leadership helps a boy accept the leadership roles of others and guides him toward the citizenship aim of Scouting.

Uniform- The uniform makes the Scout troop visible as a force of good and creates a positive youth image in the community. Boy Scouting is an action program, and wearing the uniform is an action that shows each Scout's commitment to the aims and purposes of Scouting. The uniform gives the Scout identity in a world brotherhood youth who believe in the same ideals. More is discussed about the uniform later in this guide.

SCOUT OATH AND LAW

TROOP 1 ATTENDANCE POLICY

Due to some scouts not coming to the troop meetings before a campout or other troop activity, but yet expecting to go on a scheduled activity, without having helped with the planning, will no longer be permitted to do so. Your patrol leaders council has established the following policy.

Effective January 5, 1998

For a Troop 1 scout to be allowed to attend any campout or other troop activity, the scout must attend at least 50% of all troop meeting preceding and leading up to the next activity since the last event.

This may and only will be enforced by the scouts of Troop 1. The troop scribe will keep up with attendance so that this can be checked and applied to all scouts.

Subject: SCOUT UNIFORM

To: Scouts and parents

The following is a list of the various boy scout uniform parts that are needed to meet the class A and class B uniforms worn by scouts in the troop that adhere to the Troop 1 SCOUT UNIFORM STANDARDS.

- 1. Scout shirt (short or long sleeve optional) with red or green loops and appropriate insignia (matched to loops worn) affixed required for class A.
- 2. Scout long pants required for class A.
- 3. Scout shorts required for class B and/or Summer class A.
- 4. Scout cap mesh or twill is ok color of cap to match loop color.
- 5. Scout web belt with Boy Scout emblem buckle or attached belt in pants.
- 6. Scout socks knee high style, calf length, or ankle style required when shorts are worn and with long pants when socks are visible 3 or more pairs recommended can be all green or green with red stripe style.
- 7. Any official scout t-shirt is OK for regular class B, whereas the Troop 1 class B requires the troop t-shirt which is tan with "BSA Troop 1", the scout emblem, and "Florence, Kentucky" printed in green at the left pocket position. It is only available through the troop for the current market price, usually \$8.50 \$9.50.
- 8. Patches (insignia) required for the scout shirt are the Dan Beard Council patch, troop number 1 (one provided), American flag, Patrol emblem, 60 year veteran unit bar (one provided), quality unit patch (one provided), and the world crest (one provided). Additional patches may be purchased.
- 9. A neckerchief with slide is not part of the Troop 1 uniform. Some scouts may wear a special troop bolo (currently not available) which was previously available from the troop.

Uniform inspections are conducted periodically at troop meetings and other activities. For reference, a copy of the troop's uniform inspection form is attached.



TROOP 1 UNIFORM STANDARDS

The **CLASS A** uniform is required for the following:

- TROOP MEETINGS
- COURTS OF HONOR
- PARADES, FLAG CEREMONIES AND COLOR GUARD
- UNIFORM INSPECTIONS
- SUMMER CAMP DINING HALL
- DURING TRAVEL ON TROOP OUTINGS/ACTIVITIES
- o OTHER OCCASIONS SPECIFIED BY THE PATROL LEADERS COUNCIL

The **CLASS B** uniform may be worn instead of the CLASS A for the following:

- TROOP MEETINGS FROM JUNE 1 TO SEPTEMBER 30.
- SERVICE PROJECTS
- MAIN ACTIVITIES AT WARM WEATHER CAMPOREES.
- OTHER ACTIVITIES SPECIFIED BY THE PATROL LEADERS COUNCIL.

The **TROOP 1 CLASS B** may be worn for the following:

- SUMMER CAMP DINING HALL WHEN APPROVED BY THE PLC.
- o OTHER ACTIVITIES SPECIFIED BY THE PLC.

CLASS A uniform consists of:

- SCOUT SHIRT WITH CORRECT/APPROPRIATE INSIGNIA
- SCOUT CAP OR BERET
- o TROOP BOLO OR OTHER OFFICIAL SCOUT (YOUTH) BOLO
- SCOUT LONG PANTS OR SHORTS
- OFFICIAL SCOUT BELT AND BUCKLE
- o OFFICIAL SCOUT SOCKS WITH SHORTS AND WHEN VISIBLE WITH PANTS.
- BLACK OR BROWN SHOES, LOAFERS OR HIKING BOOTS SNEAKERS THAT ARE ONLY OF ONE COLOR, BLACK, BROWN OR LIKE DARK COLOR ARE ACCEPTABLE.
- RED OR GREEN PULLOVER UNDER SCOUT SHIRT IS PERMITTED IN COLD WEATHER – COLOR MUST MATCH UNIFORM LOOPS

CLASS B uniform consists of same as CLASS A except:

- o OFFICIAL SCOUT T-SHIRT INSTEAD OF THE SCOUT SHIRT.
- o NO BOLO

TROOP 1 CLASS B uniform consists of same as CLASS except:

- TROOP 1 T-SHIRT INSTEAD OF THE SCOUT SHIRT.
- NO BOLO

CLASS C - ANY NON UNIFORM CLOTHES (CIVILIAN)

CLASS D - ANY CLOTHES THAT ARE DRY

CLASS W – WORK CLOTHES

THIS GUIDELINE IS ESSENTIALLY THE SAME CRITERIA THAT HAS BEEN FOLLOWED BY THE TROOP SINCE 1990 WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE ACTIVE PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENT CHANGES AS OF MAY 6, 2003 AND DECEMBER 15, 2008 WHICH HAS BEEN AMENDED BY THIS REVISION. IT IS INTENDED TO LET ALL SCOUTS AND PARENTS KNOW WHAT IS EXPECTED OF A TROOP 1 SCOUT FOR HIS CONTINUED ADVANCEMENT.

GENERAL

The advancement program in a Boy Scout troop is one of eight methods used to fulfill the aims of the Boy Scouts of America. It is designed to help develop a scout's self reliance and his ability to help others while providing a challenging and learning environment. As a scout earns the scout badge, it is the beginning on the trail to the rank of Eagle Scout, scouting's highest rank.

FROM BOY SCOUT BADGE TO FIRST CLASS

The structure of advancement requirements has two distinct phases. The first phase is the time when a scout will advance from scout badge through tenderfoot, second class, and first class while he develops outdoor skills and accepts the personal responsibilities of citizenship and service to others.

STAR TO LIFE TO EAGLE

The second phase of advancement begins as the scout works to earn the rank of Star Scout. After that follows Life Scout and finally the rank of Eagle Scout. Merit badges are a major part of the requirements for earning these ranks. Merit badges will open the door for a scout to explore and learn about a wide variety of subjects. With over 100 subjects ranging from citizenship, business and careers to hobbies, crafts and sports, merit badges are the means to a scout's continued development and advancement beyond first class on to eagle.

MERIT BADGES

Many merit badge subjects are ideally suited for a new scout and first year camper. Whereas other subjects require a level of knowledge or scout skill that is only acquired as a scout advances through the ranks to first class. And some require a degree of skill and maturity of a first class scout. Therefore this guideline establishes a list of merit

badge subjects defining the requirements that should be met by a scout before starting any effort to earn the merit badge. This will be the basis for granting approval to take a merit badge. As a result, a scout can and will gain the most benefit from his efforts while earning merit badges.

SERVICE WORK

Service work is a requirement for earning rank starting at Second Class and continuing through Life rank. A significant service project developed, planned and carried out by a scout is the requirement for the rank of Eagle. Refer to the TROOP 1 SERVICE GUIDELINES that defines service work effort that will qualify for rank requirements.

SCOUT SPIRIT

A specific requirement for all ranks is for a scout to "show scout spirit". This is demonstrated in various ways, whereas one particular way in TROOP 1 is through participation in troop activities other than regular troop meetings and the usual camping and troop outings. To qualify for this requirement, a scout must have participated in at least one event with our charter partner, Florence Christian Church (FCC), within the last 12 months prior to the scoutmaster conference and resulting Board of Review. Participation with the troop on the following or similar activities with FCC will qualify:

- Help at the FCC Thanksgiving dinner in November.
- Attendance at FCC on Scout Sunday in February.
- o Help at the assigned service project for FCC in the Spring of each year.

ACTIVE PARTCIPATION FOR STAR, LIFE, EAGLE, and EAGLE PALM

Requirement #1 for Star, Life, and Eagle ranks specify that a scout must be active in his troop for a specified time period.

- o Star: Be active in your troop and patrol for at least 4 months as First Star Scout.
- o Life: Be active in your troop and patrol for at least 6 months as a Star Scout.
- o **Eagle**: Be active in your troop and patrol for at least 6 months as a Life Scout.
- Eagle Palm: Be active in your troop and patrol for at least 3 months after becoming an Eagle Scout or after earning the last Eagle Palm.

Active participation must be maintained <u>at least</u> for the duration's listed above preceding the date of a scoutmaster conference for that rank. Participation that is deemed barely active may require the amount of participation to be extended. Active participation is defined as attending <u>at least</u> 50% of troop meetings and <u>at least</u> 50% of all other scheduled troop functions, i.e. service, campouts, outings, courts of honor, and all other troop activities.

MERIT BADGE PROCEDURE

This applies to all individual merit badge activity except summer camp. Procedures will be established each year to conform to the requirements of the summer camp being attended.

- Meet all prerequisites for the specific merit badge that is selected.
- Request and fill out a blue merit badge card all information should be printed in ink, be legible and have correct spelling.
- Select a merit badge counselor from the current official district list of counselors maintained by the troop. Enter the counselor's name on the blue card.
- Obtain scoutmaster approval.
- Schedule with the merit badge counselor the necessary session(s) to complete the requirements.
- After completion of the merit badge and obtaining the counselor's approval signature with a date of completion, return the merit badge counselor to the scoutmaster.
- Merit badge will be presented at an appropriate occasion.

All merit badge cards that are submitted with a counselor's signature must meet the following criteria. Any blue card not meeting these requirements will not be accepted.

- Must have prior approval from the scoutmaster.
- The counselor must be listed on the current district counselor list at the time of the approving completion of the merit badge.

SCHEDULING SCOUTMASTER CONFERENCES & BOARDS OF REVIEW

- 1. Boards of Review for advancement will be on the Third Tuesday of each month; only in extreme cases will a BOR be considered on any other meeting night. For this to be successful, I am asking Committee members to make themselves available for Boards on that night. We may have months where we will have meeting Boards of Review and months where we won't, but we need to have people available.
- 2. Scoutmaster Conferences will be available at any weekly meetings, but only those completed in advance of the BOR meeting night will be eligible for a BOR that night. In other words, I will not entertain a SM Conference and BOR for the same boy on the same night.

DUES

Dues are collected to help teach responsibility and to cover certain expenses paid throughout the year on behalf of the scout as determined by the troop committee to be necessary.

Effective January 1, 2013, dues are no longer collected on a monthly basis – they have been combined with the annual fee, as described below.

ANNUAL FEE

Experience on the majority of past fund raisers has shown that everyone who benefits from the troop program does not contribute their fair share of effort. Therefore, Troop fund raisers directed to the general account for troop operating expenses throughout the year have been discontinued.

A more equitable method to support the troop operating expenses is in effect. An annual fee will be paid by each scout to provide the required funds necessary for troop operating expenses. Each scout has the opportunity to earn this fee and more by participating in the fund raisers defined in the "SCOUT SAVINGS ACCOUNT" section herein.

An annual fee of \$150 is required to be paid by each scout if he wishes to remain a member of the troop. The fee is due at the time when the troop re-charters each year. The fee covers the charter year from January 1 through December 31.

For new scouts joining the troop, the fee is due at the time of joining. The fee will be adjusted based on the date the new scout joins the Troop.

REGISTRATION

A new scout or a scout who transfers into the troop after June of the year prior to rechartering of the following year, will pay a full year's registration fee regardless of when he joins the troop.

A new scout or a scout who transfers into the troop after the most recent re-charter will pay a proportional annual fee based on the number of months until the next re-charter.

When a scout owes the troop for lost or damaged sales merchandise or troop equipment as described in the "SCOUT RESPONSIBILITY" section herein, he must have in place a repayment plan mutually agreed to by the troop and the scout, in order to be re-registered and remain with the troop.

CAMPOREE FEES / SPECIAL EVENTS

The troop will pay Camporee fees for district or council events and some other special activities as approved by the troop committee, only for scouts with all fees paid up to date.

REFUNDS

Summer camp payment schedules and refund cutoff dates will be defined each year for the specific camp being attended. Refund policy of the summer camp will apply.

Certain event fees that are collected cannot be refunded after the fees have been paid at the time the troop registers for the event.

Food money that is collected by the patrol grub master cannot be refunded after food has been bought.

The annual fee is not refundable.

SCOUT SAVINGS ACCOUNT

The ninth point of the scout law is THRIFTY – a scout works to pay his own way.

When the troop committee designates the proceeds from specific fund raising activities are to be applied to the individual scout's account, the following will apply:

- A. Money earned individually by a scout from sales of troop sanctioned items will be credited to his account for what he has sold.
- B. All scouts participating in a fund raiser that requires a collective effort will receive and equal share of the designated proceeds credited to his account, provided that he has worked a full shift as assigned. Duration and timing of work shifts will depend on the specific fund raising event and the availability of scout resources.

Savings from a scout's account may be used for any expense that relates to scouting, such as equipment from the scout shop, summer camp fees, troop campout costs, annual fees, high adventure trips, and other costs related to participation in the scouting program.

Withdrawals from a scout's account can be accomplished by submitting a completed ACCOUNT WITHDRAWAL" voucher form to the troop treasurer.

If a scout becomes inactive, his savings account is still active until the troop re-charters each year. Should the scout drop from the troop roster at this time, any remaining funds in his account will revert to the troop's general operating account. His account balance will start at zero if he rejoins the troop at a later date.

SCOUT RESPONSIBILITY

The scout is responsible and will be held accountable for all sales items such as event tickets and popcorn/candy that he accepts on consignment to sell. He is responsible for all money from these sales until turned in to the sales event chairperson. The scout will be required to reimburse the troop for all merchandise that he has lost or made unusable and for money from sales that he has not turned in.

The scout is expected to respect and take care of troop equipment while using it. A scout will be required to pay for any damages or loss of such equipment as a result of conduct that is not consistent with the Scout Oath and Scout Law. Such extreme decisions will have the concurrence of the Patrol Leaders Council and the Troop Committee.



SCOUT SERVICE WORK

Service work that is required for rank is intended to be above and beyond the duty a scout has to his troop and community. It is part of showing scout spirit. Additionally, Troop 1 has an obligation to its charter partner, Florence Christian Church, for the support the troop receives.

To be approved for the showing scout spirit requirement, a scout must participate, within the last 12 months, in an activity or event that is associated with our charter partner. This applies for all rank advancements, second class and above, effective September 1, 1997.

SERVICE HOURS REQUIRED FOR RANK

- o 1 hour SECOND CLASS requirement 5
- o 3 hours FIRST CLASS requirement 12 show scout spirit
- o 6 hours STAR requirement 4
- o 6 hours LIFE requirement 4


SERVICE HOURS THAT QUALIFY

- o Approved service done at Florence Christian Church
 - o Flower planting and grounds clean up
 - Help at Thanksgiving dinner
 - o Other work approved in advance
- o Troop fundraisers when proceeds are designated for a worthy cause
- Help on eagle projects of other scouts
- Other services to school, church or Florence community when approved in advance.

ACTIVITIES NOT QUALIFYING AS SERVICE FOR RANK

 Troop fund raising activities when the proceeds are for the Troop account to support the troop program.

- Troop support of a community goal such as the food and clothing drive when a participation patch or other recognition is received.
 Hours worked to earn campership funds received by a scout for financial assistance toward camp fees.
- Troop service work at camp.
- o Work that is not approved in advance will not qualify.



A consistent set of guidelines is necessary to govern the use and care of troop equipment by troop scouts. Proper use will enhance the useful life of this equipment for the benefit of all. Equipment must be checked out through the Troop quartermaster and returned in ready to use condition, when practical.

Also, some important safety rules which are directed by BSA policy are defined herein.

TENTS

New scouts will be instructed and then demonstrate his ability to properly set up and pack a tent before camping.

Don't take bulky packs in tent or any other items with sharp corners or edges. Stow pack and extra gear in supply tent or under dining fly. Use ditty bag with change of clothes to take is sleeping tent.

Don't take wet or dirty shoes in tent. Put shoes/boots in plastic bag before storing inside tent.

Use only a flashlight for light in tent. Open flames including candles are not allowed in tent. Heaters and lanterns are not allowed and any chemical reaction hand warmer must be pre-approved.

Store mess kit and utensils with patrol box, not in tent.

Store food and all snacks in food box at kitchen area or bear bag when required. Only on specific occasions, such as winter camping will any food items be permitted in tents.

Store wet poncho outside tent.

Use tent for sleeping, not for clubhouse or meeting place. Camp courtesy requires that both tent partners agree before other scouts enter their tent.

When packing tent:

- o Remove all gear and clean out all debris
- Count all parts and double check
- Fold, roll and pack same way as trained

PATROL BOX

The patrol, as a group, is expected to maintain the patrol box and contents (cooking gear and utensils) in a clean condition at all times meeting sanitary standards. This equipment will be in proper condition when breaking camp and subsequent storage after campouts. Individual items of the cooking equipment will not be removed for cleanup at home without the approval of the quartermaster.

DINING FLY

No open flames near or under dining fly. Fly must be returned to storage dry and properly folded. Poles, stakes and ropes should be stowed in designated containers.

FIRES

Only scouts who have earned the FIREM'N CHIT and have demonstrated their understanding of fire safety through safe conduct around fires will be permitted to build and tend an open fire.

WOODS TOOLS

Only scouts who have earned a TOTIN' CHIP will be permitted to use woods tools on campouts. To earn this, a scout must be instructed in the proper use of an axe and saw and demonstrate his ability to handle and use these tools safely.

STOVES/LANTERNS

Scouts will not be permitted to fill or operate an gas or propane stove or lantern without proper training from an adult.

KNIVES

Pocket knives must not have a blade length longer than the largest official boy scout folding knife currently available. Fixed blade sheath knives and butterfly knives are not allowed. The privilege of carrying a pocket knife will be granted to scouts who continually demonstrate safe and responsible use of a knife.







INSTRUCTIONS FOR MERIT BADGE COUNSELORS

What's It All About?

The merit badge counselor is a key player in the Boy Scout advancement program. Whatever your area of expertise or interest—whether it is a special craft or hobby (basketry, leatherwork, coin collecting), a profession (veterinary medicine, aviation, engineering), or perhaps a life skill (cooking, personal management, communication)—as a merit badge counselor, you play a vital role in stirring a young man's curiosity about it. By serving as a counselor, you offer your time, knowledge, and other resources so Scouts have the opportunity to broaden their horizons. And in doing so, your mission is to combine fun with learning.

You are both teacher and mentor to the Scout as he learns by doing. By presenting opportunities for growth via engaging activities like designing a Web page (Computers), performing an ollie and a wheelie (Snow Sports), or fabricating rope (Pioneering), you may pique a young man's interest and inspire a Scout to develop a lifelong hobby, pursue a particular career, or become an independent, self-supporting adult.

Learning to Be a Merit Badge Counselor

All merit badge counselors should seek training. It is important that they have a full understanding of their responsibilities and also of the recommended practices for quality counseling. The presentation "The Essentials of Merit Badge Counseling" has been designed for this purpose and covers the following topics:

Processing This Application

Merit badge counselors *must* register as adult Scouters and be approved by the council advancement committee for each merit badge listed on this Merit Badge Counselor Information form. A merit badge counselor does not have to pay a registration fee, but must complete an Adult Application for position code 42, fill out this form, and complete BSA Youth Protection training. Counselors may wish to associate with a particular unit but are encouraged to serve any Scout from any unit.

Special Qualifications and Guidelines for Merit Badge Counselors

A number of merit badges involve activities that are restricted or require certification or special training for those supervising these activities. See the *Guide to Advancement*, topic 7.0.1.1, "Qualifications of Counselors." Merit badge counselors may personally meet these required qualifications, or they may use others so qualified. Additionally, the BSA *Guide to Safe Scouting* has specific requirements and procedures for shooting sports and for aquatics, winter, and other activities. These policies apply to all BSA activities, including merit badge instruction. For other merit badges where specific BSA requirements do not exist, counselors should have sufficient depth of knowledge and experience to understand how to safely present the material.

Instructions to Counselors

- The unit leader (Scoutmaster, Varsity Coach, crew Advisor, or Skipper) recommends and provides the name and contact information
 of at least one merit badge counselor to each Scout desiring to work on a merit badge. Before beginning to work with a youth,
 counselors should check the boy's merit badge application (blue card) to ensure it is signed by the unit leader.
- Every Scout must have a buddy with him at each meeting with a merit badge counselor. This buddy could be another Scout, a parent or guardian, a brother or sister, or a relative or friend. There is no one-on-one contact allowed with Scouts and counselors—the buddy requirement is mandatory.
- Counselors may not add to or delete any merit badge requirements. Group instruction is allowed where special facilities and
 expert personnel make this most practical, or when Scouts are dependent on a few counselors for assistance. However, any group
 experience must provide attention to every individual candidate's projects and progress, and assure each has actually and personally
 fulfilled all the requirements. If, for example, a requirement uses words like "show," "demonstrate," or "discuss," then every Scout
 must individually do so. It is unacceptable to award badges on the basis of Scouts sitting in classrooms and watching demonstrations
 or remaining silent during discussions.
- When a Scout begins working on a merit badge, the current-year *Boy Scout Requirements* book lists the official requirements in effect at that time. If requirements change after a Scout has started working on a merit badge, he may stay with the requirements in effect when he started unless the BSA's National Council places a specific timeline on the implementation of new requirements.
